# **FOEN - Forest reproductive material**

### 1. General

#### 1.1 The issue at hand

To ensure that Swiss forests remain healthy and adaptable, it is important that only seeds and plants (reproductive material) suited to the location be used. Anyone who imports forest reproductive material in excess of the tolerance limit requires a licence from the <u>FOEN</u>.

#### 1.2 Basis and information

- List of forest trees whose reproductive material is subject to a licence obligation

#### 1.3 Reference in Tares

Tariff items that are relevant under forest health law contain the note "Licence obligation: FOEN-FRM".

## 1.4 Terminology

Reproductive material	- Seeds (cones, infructescences, fruits and seeds intended for planting)
	<ul> <li>Parts of plants (cuttings, hardwood cuttings, shoots, roots and grafts, as well as other plant tissue intended for planting)</li> </ul>
	- Planting material (plants grown from seed or parts of plants, sets and wildlings)

# 2. Information in the customs/goods declaration

Anyone importing forest reproductive material must provide an indication in the goods declaration regarding the restriction obligation and enter the FOEN licence.

# **Tolerance limit**

A licence is required to import planting material only in the case of 200 trees or more. There are no allowances for importing seeds - a licence is required in all cases.
