# **FSVO - CITES Import other than live plants EU**

#### 1. General

# 1.1 Background

The CITES Convention is an international trade convention designed to ensure the conservation and sustainable use of animal and plant populations. International cooperation is intended to prevent international trade from resulting in overexploitation of animal and plant species that are endangered or threatened with extinction.

Protected animals and plants and parts thereof, or goods with components thereof, that are imported into Switzerland must be accompanied by a CITES certificate from the country of origin and be inspected at a species protection control post. In addition, certain CITES consignments require a permit from the <u>FSVO</u>.

There are also regulations governing the import of protected but non-CITES items that are subject to the Hunting Act and the Federal Act on Fish, and articles that may easily be mistaken for CITES items.

#### 1.3 Reference in Tares

Tariff items that are often relevant under species protection law contain the note "NZE: FSVO - CITES Import other than live plants EU". However, in principle, goods under any tariff heading may contain components of protected animals or plants. If this is the case, the corresponding NZE/regulation code has to be entered in the customs declaration, even if there is no note to this effect in Tares (general clause).

# 2. Information in the customs/goods declaration

Anyone importing goods subject to species protection legislation must provide an indication in the goods declaration regarding the regulation requirement and enter the requisite CITES certificate and/or permit from the FSVO. In addition, the goods declaration must contain the name of the species protection control post at which the inspection is to take place.

### 3. Further information

### 3.1 Inspection requirement

Anyone importing goods subject to species protection legislation must present them for inspection at the species protection control post within two days after they have been cleared through customs.

#### 3.2 Certificates

Import consignments of goods regulated under species protection legislation must be accompanied by the following documents:

#### 3.3 Species protection inspection fee

The person subject to the declaration obligation must manually enter the fee for the species protection inspection in the customs declaration. It is levied as part of the customs clearance for each customs declaration.

If, in addition to the species protection inspection fee, the goods are subject to a fee for border veterinary controls or for inspections by the Swiss Federal Plant Protection Service (SPPS), this will

If the goods are subject to both the CITES fauna fee and the CITES flora fee, only the CITES fauna fee should be entered.

# 3.4 Other exemptions from the inspection and/or licence obligation

be levied, in which case the CITES fee does not need to be entered.

#### **Household effects**

If the criteria for household effects are met, **non-live** goods covered by species protection may be imported without having to indicate the regulation code, without a permit, without a CITES certificate and without a species protection inspection.

This does not apply for live goods covered by species protection.

### Products exchanged between scientific institutions

The non-commercial lending, donation or exchange of preserved goods covered by species protection and of live CITES plant material between scientific institutions (which are recognised by and registered with the relevant CITES authority) is not subject to requirements on certificates, permits, inspections or fees. The consignments are accompanied only by certificates from the institution. The declaration is performed without any indication of a regulation code.
